You can choose what kind of mask to wear. There are two types of non-medical masks (2-layer cloth or disposable general purpose) that can be used where masks are required. Cloth masks should be washed after each use from those in your steady contacts. Medical masks (surgical, N95 and KN95) should be used for situations where there is prolonged contact with others (e.g., air travel). These are more effective than cloth masks at preventing the spread of viruses and for those providing care to positive or suspected cases of COVID-19.</p>
